# Peddling Ahead With The Life Cycle Consortium

Westside Resource Centre and An Mheitheal Rothar have joined forces to bring the new "Up-cycling of Bicycles and eBikes Pilot Initiative" to Galway city... and to Westside. Earlier this year, the Department of Rural and Community Development, in conjunction with the Department of Transport, announced the introduction of a pilot initiative for the provision of high quality up-cycled bicycles and e-bikes to those on low incomes and those who are marginalised or disadvantaged. Seeing the opportunity to work together, Westside Resource Centre and An Mheitheal Rothar set about applying for the new pilot scheme under the banner of the "Life Cycle Consortium" - and were confirmed as one of just 5 successful applicants in Ireland.

The Life Cycle Consortium will oversee this innovative new project and will work to meet the objective of the overall initiative which includes - the promotion of a shift towards cycling, the development of bike reuse and recycling enterprise, the provision of up-cycled bicycles for to those on low incomes and most marginalised, the provision of employment, work placements and effective training programmes for specific disadvantaged individuals and the reduction of the number of bikes going to landfill sites etc.

The whole initiative is funded through the Community Services Programme. Westside Resource Centre and An Mheitheal Rothar have a strong track record in delivering projects which bring benefits to the community and to the environment. This exciting new programme will be up and running in the near future and will involve opportunities for people right across the community to participate in many different ways. We will keep you informed of developments...and best of luck to the new project.

#### Reviewing 2021 - An eye to the future... and the past

To say that 2021 has been a year of ups and downs would be an understatement. We have gone from "lock down" to "open up" to all places in between! COVID-19 continues to impact on all of our lives and yet society must carry on. We try to remain positive whilst being careful and cautious as we navigate our way through challenging times. A new year is fast approaching and it is natural that we look forward to better times. It is also fitting that we recall those who have suffered, or are suffering, serious ill health and indeed those who have lost family or friends during the pandemic.

As the year progressed, Westside Resource Centre moved with the winds of change and has continued to operate in line with the ever-changing guidelines. Many of our usual activities were simply not possible because of the public health restrictions. However, most of the community group's and voluntary organisations with whom we work have carried on in some shape or form. They are determined and eager to resume their activities as soon as possible. It is unusual for us to find the building this quiet and we have used the time to make some upgrades and enhancements that would otherwise have been very disruptive. We have created some new flexible meeting spaces and we are also working to build a larger conference room by combining two existing rooms into one.

In the times ahead, we will make better use of our outdoor spaces and extend facilities such as the children's play area. Underused spaces can be adapted to provide meeting and performance spaces for use during festivals and other public expenses for use for the festival expenses for the festival expen events. Some sections maybe be suitable

platforms for temporary gazebos or awnings to provide shelter for open-air gatherings. We would also like to introduce more planting to enhance the area, to encourage biodiversity and to complement the work of Westside Community Organic Garden. Technology is continually advancing and we are investing in new equipment such as video conferencing, audio visual displays, computer and communications upgrades. All of these improvements will help to keep the Centre up to date and will be of benefit to all of our clients and community now and in the future.

A turbulent 2021 is almost over. We are reminded that 1921 was also a tumultuous year in Irish history. In the month of December, exactly 100 years ago, the Anglo Irish Treaty was signed in London and there followed a cascade of events that led to the Irish Civil War. The themes of national sovereignty, borders and relationships between neighbouring jurisdictions were the order of the day. For all the passage of time, we can still hear the echoes of these distant debates in contemporary affairs, for example, as the repercussions of Brexit continue to unfold.

New challenges appear with every new year. However, there are also new opportunities. Westside Resource Centre has the privilege of working with an incredible range of active and committed organisations and community groups. We will continue to foster these relationships and open new partnerships to tackle some of the challenges facing our society. We are thankful for the support of our community, our staff & volunteers, our clients & service users and our funders. We look forward to 2022 with a clear eye... and with optimism.

#### Westside Patchers


We 'Westside Patchers' acknowledge with gratitude the funding received from Galway City Partnership Restart Grant Scheme, SICAP and Galway City Council. The grant has helped us to regroup safely while observing necessary COVID-19 restrictions. Our meetings allow us to continue our craftwork, while relieving the social isolation experienced by our members since March 2020.

#### Weaning Workshops

This year has proven a challenging one for all the people of Galway and there have been a lot of "small" new arrivals into our community.

Galway City Partnership along with the HSE, TUSLA and CYPSI have been running workshops on Feeding Your Baby for the last number of years. These took place in local community centres where new parents had the opportunity to meet each other in a group setting and share their experiences with a Community Nutritionist on introducing their babies to solids.

This year, like several other workshops, these took place over Zoom. The response and participation has been fantastic. We recognise that there is no replacement for meeting in person but we hope that these workshops have gone some way to supporting new parents.



#### **Community Gardeners Show Their Mettle**

Once again in 2021 the volunteer gardeners faced the COVID-19 restrictions. The intrepid few worked in twos and threes (adhering to HSE guidelines) to prepare the ground and plant potatoes and a range of vegetables; all of which grew well. Fruit trees produced beautiful apples and plums and soft fruit was saved and made into delicious jams. Great credit is due to them for their commitment.

Gardening contributes to our wellbeing; easing loneliness, stress, etc and giving a real boost to our mental health as well as the produce benefiting our physical health, especially when no pesticides are used in the growing process. The taste is superior, too.

The aim of all the community gardens in Galway City is to increase their activity and thereby contribute to the reduction of Ireland's carbon footprint, we make our own compost and don't use peat moss. We encourage pollinators by planting insect-attracting plants. Other wildlife is attracted by insects which they feed on. We observe increased bird activity also and suspect we have small mammals which forage for "leftover vegetables".

We would welcome volunteers in Spring 2022. Make it part of your New Year's resolutions. Do try it out, you might like it. The garden is open on Wednesday mornings from 10:30am. Support and training will be given and it's an opportunity to learn how to grow your own at home.

#### **Social Enterprises ARISE**

collective of Galway-based social enterprises have come together to apply to a new scheme know as ARISE. This scheme is sponsored by the Department of Rural and Community Development and established to raise awareness of social enterprise all across Ireland. In Galway City, Westside Resource Centre has joined up with An Mheitheal Rothar, Galway Community Circus, GOCOM Radio and Bounce Back Recycling to make an application. Each of these organisations is very active in their respective fields - community services, arts and culture, integration and employment, environmental work etc. - but they are also thriving social enterprises.

The Social Enterprise model has been around for many years but is now beginning to receive greater recognition. In 2019, the government launched a new policy for social enterprise in Ireland. This policy defines a social enterprise as an "enterprise whose objective is to achieve a social, societal or environmental impact, rather than maximising profit for its owners or shareholders. It pursues its objectives by trading on an ongoing basis through the provision of goods and/or services, and by reinvesting surpluses into achieving social objectives. It is governed in a fully accountable and transparent manner and is independent of the public sector. If dissolved, it should transfer its assets to another organisation with a similar mission."

We are happy to report that the application was successful, and this group of Galway-based social enterprises will be bringing their story to a wider audience in a variety of ways – through local media, in promotional events and activities and via social media platforms in the months ahead. The idea is to shine a light on the organisations themselves and to celebrate the very positive contribution that social enterprises are making right across a whole range of sectors. The application was submitted and supported by Galway City Partnership who also provide guidance and assistance to start up social enterprises in Galway City.

#### **Galway Contact**



Our main aim is to ease loneliness and feelings of isolation among older people and to provide support for those caring for the elderly.

Our Befriending service is unique in that our volunteers visit an older person each week on a 1:1 basis providing company and friendship. In the current COVID environment visits have paused but our volunteers continue to maintain contact with their older friend via phone. Referrals can come from the person themselves, their family or health professionals and always with the consent of the older person. All our volunteers are Garda vetted.

Another service we provide is the Seniors Alert Scheme grant for over-65s, which covers all Galway City and County. Early detection of falls and emergencies can save lives and minimise resulting side effects.

In "normal" times we run a Friday Morning Club for older people. We provide free transport to and from this club with our wheelchair accessible bus. We also provided transport to and from a weekly Lunch & Social Club.

# Crime Prevention A message from Galway Garda

Unfortunately, everyone can receive visits from bogus callers and our vulnerable persons are sometimes targeted by criminals. Information on how to identify and protect yourself from these types of crime can be found on www.garda.ie/en/crime-prevention/crime-prevention Bogus callers will say anything to get into your home or onto your property, including producing false identification claiming to be there in an official capacity.

#### Take precautions –

- Do not open the door to anyone before you've checked who it is and what they want. Use your door viewer and chain/limiter.
- Check identification, where appropriate.
- Do not leave strangers unattended at your doorstep.
- Ensure your back door is locked when you answer a call at the front door.
- Keep gates to yards closed.

We advise and encourage people not to engage with such callers. Don't open your door to anyone before you have checked who it is and what they want. They can be intimidating and refuse to take no for an answer. Please pass this advice on to those in our community that may live alone or be susceptible to engaging with strangers.

#### Croí na Gaillimhe

Croí na Gaillimhe is a Resource Centre of St Vincent de Paul based in 1 Mill Street, Galway. We provide services and support to a number of groups in the community and keep people connected through our educational programmes and club. The only criteria to join is need.

Older people: We run a lunch & social club twice a week (Mon & Wed) for isolated elderly people, offering social contact and other practical supports. We also organise a variety of classes such as art, crafting, digital literacy, creative writing, yoga, etc. We invite guest speakers on relevant health, safety, and local history topics. We participate in Bealtaine, Positive Ageing and Social Inclusion Week.

**Classes** for adults in the community include sewing & mending, quilting and digital literacy.

Intergenerational Group: Young Heart (Elderly People from the community and Teenagers). We run an intergenerational programme with transition year students from local schools and older adults on a Monday morning. We have covered many topics over the years: Art, Creative Writing, Drama, Astronomy, Marine Studies and the Environment.

**Men's Group** The core work is complemented by other activities such as group outings, guest facilitators (health topics), digital literacy classes, photography and Tai Chi.

**Asylum Support Group:** This programme involves supporting people in the asylum system to complete their IPO applications and prepare for interview or appeal (for refugee status).

**Homework Club:** for children living in direct provision; providing a quiet, supportive environment and space for children to complete their homework.

**Children's Activities:** We organise activities for children living in Direct Provision, which include swimming, rugby tots, dancing, and soccer.

Adults Conversational English: Failte Isteach is a weekly conversational English language class taking place from September to June for migrants, asylum seekers and refugees.

**Integration-specific programmes:** Weekly community choir and physical activity classes, as well as opening all our activities to all the people in the community and beyond.

#### **Galway Sports Partnership**

We have been working with our colleagues in Sport Ireland (SI) and the Network of Local Sports Partnerships (LSPs) to deliver activity and exercise programmes across a wide variety of media to people of a broad range of abilities. It is vital that we keep our minds and bodies active during this time. Physical activity has a very positive effect on your mental health and we encourage as many of you as possible take up some type of activity of the coming weeks. Especially as the days get that bit darker.

Adults should be moderately active for a minimum of 30 minutes a day and children should be moderately active for 60 minutes a day. This is easier than you think. For one, the time can be broken up into manageable chunks e.g. 3 x 10mins. Moderate means that there is a noticeable increase in your heart rate and breathing, you can talk but not sing.



#### Irish Sign Language Day December 14th

RehabCare's RISE Service in Westside wish to congratulate the Irish Deaf Society (IDS) on their 40th anniversary this year. Over the last 40 years, the IDS have campaigned tirelessly on behalf of Deaf people in Ireland to raise awareness around Deaf culture, rights and education.

The IDS also work to promote the rights of deaf people to use Irish Sign Language (ISL) and to have their language recognised as a language with its own distinct grammar, a complex linguistic structure and its own unique rules and features. On Dec 14th 2017, the IDS and the Irish Deaf Community celebrated as the "Recognition of Irish Sign Language for the Deaf Community Bill 2016" was passed by all stages of the Oireachtas. This Bill was revised and later became the "Irish Sign Language Act" which was signed into Law by the President on December 24, 2017.

This Act requires that public services are available through ISL and also outlines the need for greater access to education through sign language. Prior to the passage of the Act, there was no automatic right for deaf people to have an ISL interpreter (except for criminal court proceedings). For the Deaf community, recognition of ISL means more legal rights and better access to public services including education, healthcare, media and banking, This day has become a very special day within the Deaf Community and Dec 14th this year marks the fourth year since the passing of the Act.

#### The National Advocacy Service

The National Advocacy Service (NAS) is a service funded and supported by the Citizens Information Board (CIB). Advocacy is provided through four regions and our National office is in Dublin. Regional Manager Anne Feehily leads the Western Region. Advocates in the Western region cover Donegal, Sligo, Leitrim, Mayo Roscommon, Galway, Clare and Limerick. The Galway office is based in Westside Resource Centre.

NAS provides a free, professional and confidential advocacy service to people with disabilities. Our vision for society is one where people can make their own choices, exercise their rights with dignity, autonomy, equality and independence at the core. We recognise the capacity of persons with disabilities to make their own decisions equally with others in accordance with the United Nations Convention on the Rights of People with Disabilities (UNCRPD).

Should a person experience difficulties in asserting their rights/views, this can lead to limited choices and little control over their lives. An advocate can help address this by with gathering meeting the person. information, assessing suitability for our service, working together with the person to develop an advocacy plan in accordance with the person's wishes. NAS advocates work with people in a person-centred way to ensure the person's voice is heard and considered by the relevant services and ensuring their rights are safeguarded.

During these uncertain times of the COVID-19 pandemic, NAS advocates are continuing to offer advocacy services in line with public health guidelines. #### **Supports for Social Enterprises**

Galway City Partnership's aim to work with groups and communities to tackle disadvantage and long-term unemployment takes many different forms. Social enterprise is an approach that several existing community groups use, and new groups are exploring it to create a social impact and include those from their communities whilst trading as a business. GCP aims to provide support to a vibrant, dynamic and sustainable social enterprise sector through the following supports:

- -One-to-one mentoring support for start-up and growing of social enterprises
- -Training especially designated for social enterprises
- -Limited grants for specific funding needs
- -Networking opportunities for social enterprises
- -Resources on best practices for social enterprises

This year has seen further challenges in responding to needs in communities through using a social enterprise approach. Social enterprises are increasingly building their skills and developing innovative ways to address social issues generating sustainable employment, wealth generation and alternative means of communication in communities they work and reside in.

Galway City Partnership is offering social enterprises training on identified skills development such as Branding, Digital Marketing, HR, Procurement, Marketing and Going Online to name a few. Individual mentoring is also on offer by request. This is funded by The Departments of Rural and Community Development through The Social Enterprise Regeneration Programme (SERP).

#### **Access for All**

Access For all is a network of individuals who have direct lived experiences of disabilities and local disability organisations, that focus on continually improving the accessibility of the local built environment. This year has proved extra difficult for people with disabilities as many of the adaptations that took place in our public spaces ended up excluding those with disabilities. These included lack of access to public bathrooms provided by the hospitality services, illegal parking and shops introducing traffic light systems that excluded those with visual impairments.

Accessibility matters to us all and this has been at a time when disabled people have experienced additional exclusions as a result of restrictions. Despite these restrictions, Access for All have sought to champion the rights of disabled people to have their voices heard in conversations about "opening up the city" and "mobility plans". The group has met with the Galway City Council Mobility Team, called on our own elected city councillors and contacted city businesses through Galway Chamber.

Each year International Day of People with Disabilities is celebrated on 3<sup>rd</sup> December and Access for All wants to be included in the conversation and contribute to solutions around our local environment so we can all be in a better position to access it.

Members of Access for All have been involved in creating an Audio Mapping Project. This will be finalised with an audio piece and a mapping pamphlet. The audio piece will be put on various social media platforms including: Access for All Facebook Page https://www.facebook.com/AccessforAllGalway Galway City Partnership Facebook Page, Galway City Community Network Facebook Page and Galway City Council Facebook Page.

The group have also created a mapping pamphlet around access issues in Galway City. This pamphlet is A5in size but opens up to an A2 poster.



#### **Classes and Courses**

We would be very happy to welcome people back to the local Resource Centres at Westside, Ballinfoile and Ballybane. However, we must remain vigilant and abide by the government guidelines.

Throughout the vear at Galwav Partnership, in conjunction with the Galway Roscommon Education and Training Board (GRETB), we provide several unaccredited unemployed courses to the underemployed. All of these are free of charge but participants must register their interest with Galway City Partnership and GRETB. The courses generally take place in the local Resource Centres around the city, i.e. Ballinfoile, Ballybane and Westside. Examples of some of the unaccredited courses are Art. Yoga and Photography. In the main, they begin at 10am and finish at 12 noon, although we also have a cookery class that begins at 3 in the afternoon. They take place one day per week over an eight-week period, i.e. eight classes. They are designed as taster for individuals who programmes are considering a return to education.

GCP also provide a range of free accredited courses to those who register their interest and who are unemployed or underemployed. The accredited courses are QQI certified at levels 3 to 6. Examples in the past have been HACCP Healthcare. (Handling Food Hygienically - which is required for all those working around food) and Special Needs Assistant courses. GCP collaborate with several educational providers around the city and information regarding individual specific requirements is freely available. accredited courses can last for anything from two full days in the classroom (e.g. HACCP) OOI Level 3), to three months (e.g. Special Needs Assistant Course (SNA) QQI Level 6). Other courses on offer include Safe Pass. Manual Handling, Interview Skills & Start Your Own Business. Interested learners can register with Donnacha at Galway City Partnership 091-773466




#### Get A Vaccine Give A Vaccine

#### Galway City Museum - Treaty 100 Project

To mark the centenary of the signing of the Anglo Irish Treaty, Galway City Museum is engaging with five local groups to explore ten influential figures, with connections to Galway, who supported or opposed the Treaty, and the reasons for their historic decision. The figures will include Galway's seven Sinn Féin TDs (Pádraic Ó Máille, Liam Mellows, Brian Cusack, Frank Fahy, Joseph Whelehan, George Nicolls, and Patrick Hogan), Ada English (NUI), Alice Cashel (Galway Co. Co.) and Thomas Gilmartin (Archbishop of Tuam), five of whom supported the Treaty and five of whom opposed it. Having explored the personalities and examined their contribution to the Treaty debates

or in the local press, the groups will create a short illustrated biography of each individual, distilling their arguments on the Treaty. The project output will form the basis of an add-on element to the Museum's Revolution in Galway, 1913-23 Exhibition and an online exhibition.
